DHS Child Care Assistance Program Changes

- Changes will become effective July 1st!
- What is the Child Care Assistance Program? Child Care Assistance (CCA) is a program available to the children of income-eligible parents who are absent for a portion of the day due to employment or participation in academic or vocational training or PROMISE JOBS activities. Assistance may also be available for a limited period of time to the children of a parent looking for employment.
- What are the changes? The changes include:
 - Moving from a 6-month to a 12-month certification period
 - Allowing for temporary changes in work, education and training activities
 - Allowing more time for job search activities for families currently receiving Child Care Assistance

- The new Child Care Assistance Plus (CCA Plus) Program
- A higher payment rate for QRS Level 5 child care providers

Natural Resources: Addressing Early Childhood Emotional and Behavioral Problems

According to recent reports (see below), more than 10% of young children have clinically significant mental health problems, but most receive no interventions for their disorder. Although often not recognized, young children experience mental health problems at rates similar to older children.

Improved access to care, more research identifying alternative models, adequate payment for providers, and improved education on evidence-based interventions are among the recommendations in the November 2016 American Academy of Pediatrics policy statement and technical report Addressing Early Childhood Emotional and Behavioral Problems. The policy is available at <u>http://dx.doi.org/10.1542/peds.2016-3023</u> and the technical report at <u>http://dx.doi.org/10.1542/peds.2016-3025</u>; both will be published in the December issue of Pediatrics.

Early intervention and evidence-based family-focused therapies are key to helping young children with emotional and behavioral problems. The policy summarizes empirically supported approaches to mental health care for young children, describes barriers to interventions and proposes recommendations to enhance care.

PRAMS News (Pregnancy Risk Monitoring System)

The Pregnancy Risk Assessment Monitoring System (PRAMS) is a surveillance project that collects state-specific, population-based data on maternal attitudes and experiances before, during, and shortly after pregnancy. PRAMS data can be used to identify groups of women and infants at high risk for health problems, to monitor changes in health status, and to measure progress towards goals in improving the helath of mothers and babies
